


Supply Chain Barriers to Trade

Definition: The lack of infrastructure, institutions, policies and services facilitating the free flow of goods over borders

How to create opportunities for the logistics industry



Key actions for European trade policy

- Holistic approach for trade negotiations covering key sectors like transport and distribution as well as policy areas impacting supply chain performance (e.g., border management, foreign investment, products safety...)
- Streamline trade procedures for legitimate traders (e.g., mutual recognition of certifications; pre-clearance, immediate release of the goods, reduction of inspections)
- Efficient border and protection management and coordination of the agencies to a 'Single Window' approach for trade based on electronic notification of data (reliability of processes)
- Risk-based approach for control along the supply chain and for border management
- Common global documentary and data standards to reduce administrative costs, errors and time for trade
